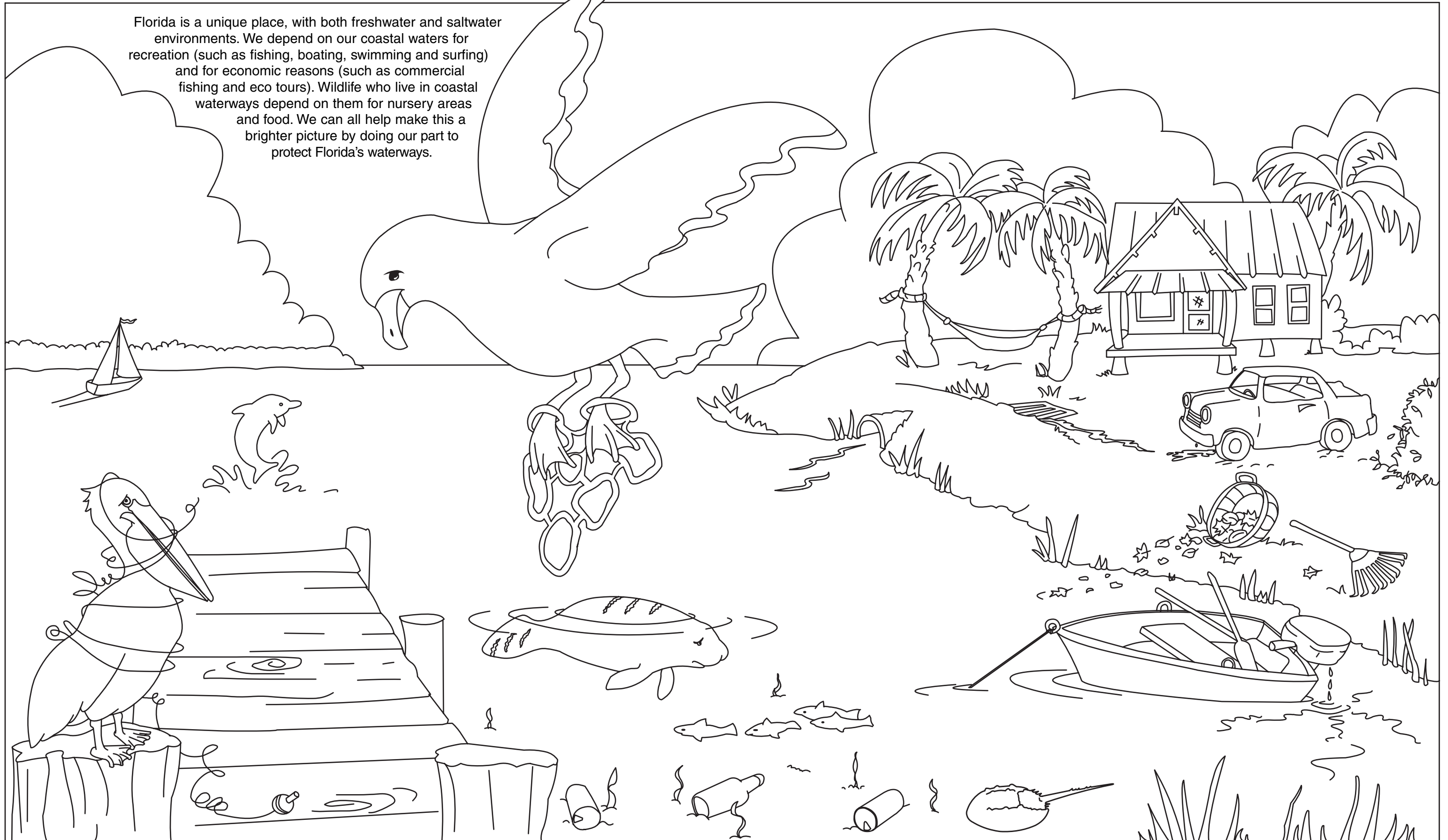


What's wrong with this picture?

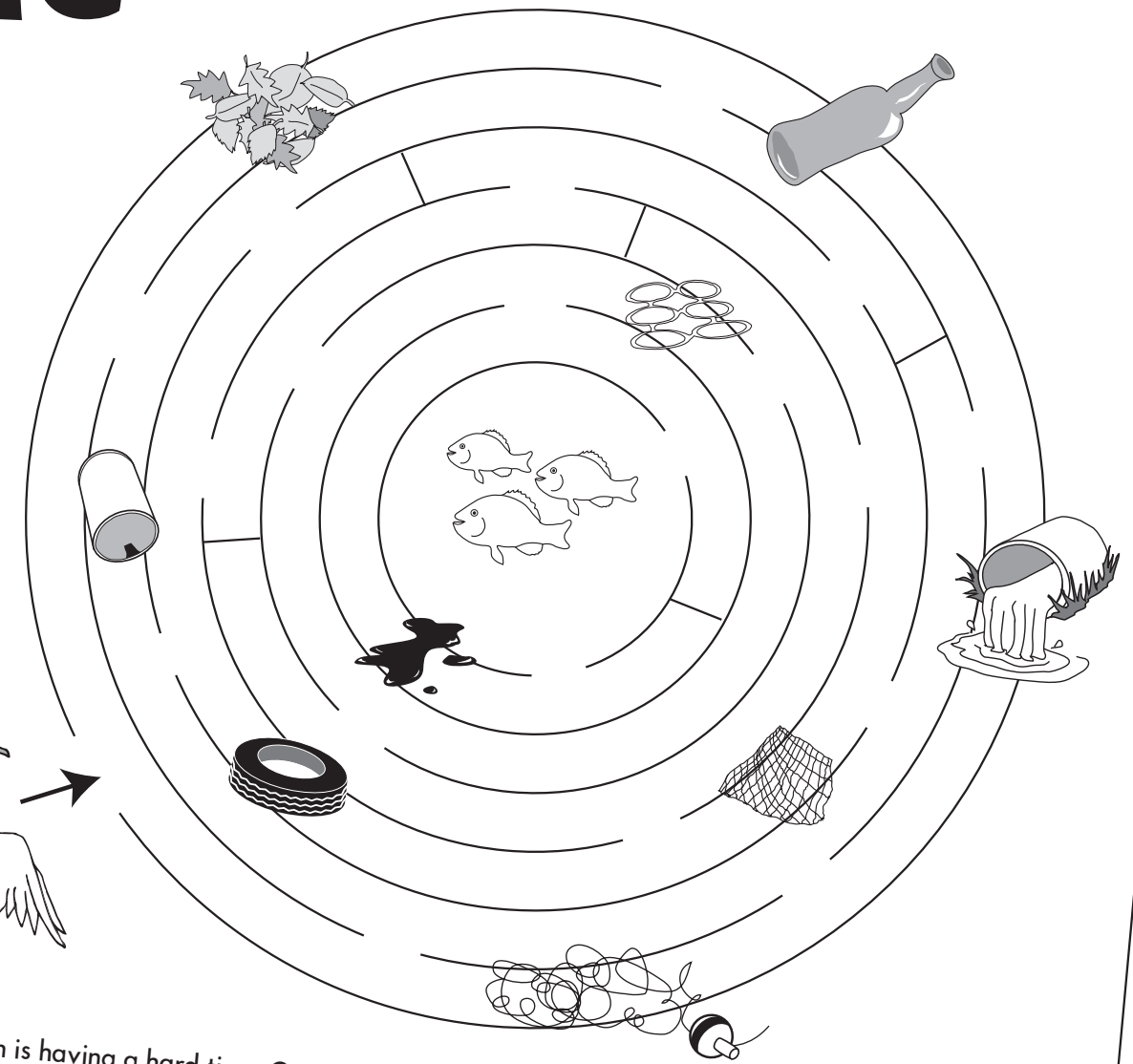
